

December Wednesday Walk

Wed. December 15, 7:30am Atwell Island

Atwell Island is a 7000 acre restoration project of the Bureau of Land Management on the southeastern portion of Tulare Lake, which 100 years ago was the largest freshwater lake west of the Mississippi. Steve Laymon is the Project Manager and will lead the field trip to three ponds with wetlands located near the town of Alpaugh. There will be possibility of seeing ducks, geese, wading birds, shorebirds as well as soras, rails and bitterns. The nature trail on the project offers blue-gray gnatcatchers and thrashers, among others.

The field trip will gather at the **Stockdale Park n Ride** (located between Real Rd. & Hiway 99) at **7:30am on Wed. Dec. 15th**, returning by 2:00pm. Bring water, snacks, binoculars and weather-appropriate clothes. There will be walking and it could be muddy. You may bring a lunch or there is a good Mexican restaurant in Alpaugh which also has good hamburgers! For more information, contact Roger Coley (832-1820). SANDHILL CRANES GET A LARGE RECEPTION

On Saturday, November 13, over 35 members of Kern Audubon made their way to the National Wildlife Refuge in Pixley to view the evening fly-in of the cranes as they came in to roost for the evening. Two members of the refuge staff, Nick Stanley and Pam Williams, gave a short history of the refuge and facts about the birds. After walking to the viewing area at about 5 PM, just as the sun was setting, over 3,000 cranes flew in. Their calls combined with the flapping of their wings provided a unique symphony. Tulare Audubon was present and provided refreshments along with Kern Audubon. Over 100 folks were in attendance and everyone hopes the event will be repeated next year.

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

One of the traditions long-associated with the Audubon Society is the annual Christmas Bird Count, which is actually older than Audubon itself. The CBC began in 1900 as an alternative to the traditional Christmas bird hunt, ion which teams shot as many birds as possible. The first count included 27 people in 25 locations, but they were armed with pencils and binoculars! The CBC is the oldest bird census in the world with over 50,000 volunteers in 2000 locations providing one of the most important bodies of information on wildlife data in the world.

Leading the Bakersfield CBC is John Wilson, one of our area's expert birders. The count will be held on Wed. Dec. 15th, 7:00am - 5pm. Meet on Mirror Drive near the west entrance to Hart Park. The day will conclude with no-host dinner at Cindy's restaurant on Auburn Blvd. to compile the results. For more information, contact John: jcwilson@lightspeed.net

"I'm not a hunter--should I buy a Duck Stamp?!

Since 1934, federal duck stamp sales have raised more than \$750 million, and this funding has been used to purchase or lease over 5.3 million acres of waterfowl habitat. Ninety-eight cents out of every dollar generated by duck stamp sales goes directly to the purchase or lease of wetland habitat in the National Wildlife Refuge system, and the federal duck stamp program has been called one of the most successful conservation programs ever initiated.

Not convinced? Waterfowl are not the only species that benefit from wetland preservation--shorebirds, riparian songbirds, and Sandhill Cranes thrive at California's wildlife refuges, and many mammals, fish, reptiles, and amphibians rely on these habitats as well. An estimated one-third of the nation's endangered and threatened species take advantage of these refuges.

The federal duck stamp serves as an entrance pass for national wildlife refuges where admission is normally charged, and duck stamps are also popular collector items.

The number of hunters is declining, but the need to protect wetlands is not. Purchasing a duck stamp each year is one of the best investments you can make to ensure that these valuable habitats continue to thrive.



The 2010 federal duck stamp features an American Wigeon and California's 2010 stamp features a pair of Redhead Ducks. You can purchase federal stamps at many post offices, at many sporting/outdoor stores or online (www.duckstamp.com). The California stamp can be purchased at hunter check stations, from the Department of Fish & Game offices or online (www.dfg.ca.gov).

GOOD NEWS FOR PRESERVATION

Kern Audubon was one of many groups that provided written feedback that a proposed motorsports racetrack near the Poppy Preserve was incompatible with the preserve. This report was recently received:

The plan to build a motorsports racetrack near the California State Poppy Reserve has been halted. We didn't have much hope when we started this, but thought we had to try to stop it. All the letters, emails and testimony at several LA Co. Planning Commission hearings paid off.

The developer has decided to sell the land to a solar company, which will use it for mitigation lands when its project in the Antelope Valley is approved. As this parcel is part of the area the State originally identified as the best place to preserve poppies, this is very good news. The State was only able to purchase some of the recommended area at the time the Preserve was founded. The developer is quoted in an Antelope Valley Press article as saying that his idea "was met with overwhelming opposition that eventually snuffed it out". Unfortunately, the AV Press is not available on-line. Perhaps the LA Times will run a story that can be read by all.
