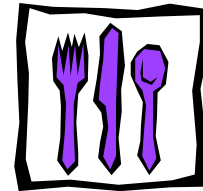

DECEMBER FIELD TRIPS



Wed. December 14 - Beale Park and the Kern River @ Sam Lynn Ball Park.

Bill Moffat will lead a morning of birding as part of the Bakersfield Christmas Bird Count. We will start at Beale Park (Oleander & Dracena), a noted birding hot spot, from **8:30 - 10:30am**. For those who want to continue on or join us later, the birding will continue along the Kern River behind Sam Lynn Ballpark on North Chester from **11:00 - 1:00pm**. This will be a wonderful experience for birders of all levels. We will provide binoculars if needed.

8:30am - Meet at Beale Park on Oleander near the amphitheater (north side of the park). For Sam Lynn Ballpark, take the first right turn past the ball field and drive to parking area along the canal. Walk over the canal bridge to the viewing area along the river. We will be contributing our sightings to the Bakersfield Christmas Bird Count. Call Bill, 661-201-9279, for more information.

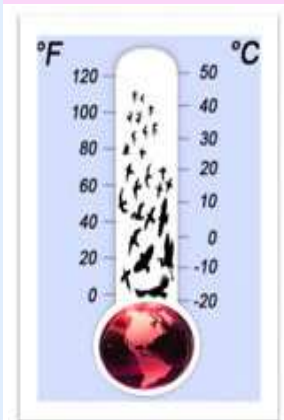

CLIMATE CHANGE CORNER: QUESTION: HOW CAN HUMANS BE SO POWERFUL AS TO IMPACT THE ENTIRE ATMOSPHERE?

Scientists know our climate is changing, primarily due to carbon pollution from the burning of dirty energy like oil and coal. It's true that other factors impact our climate, including other greenhouse gases such as methane. Solar variation, volcanoes, and clouds all effect the climate, too. Humans, however, release at least 100 times more carbon dioxide into the air than volcanoes. Emissions from Mount Pinatubo, the strongest volcanic eruption over the past 50 years, amounted to just 0.2 percent of human emissions in 1991.

Post-Election Message from David Yarnold, President, National Audubon Society

_____ tory. Now, as has been the case for 219 years, the United States expects a seamless transition of power – one of the great innovations of a representative democracy. I’m adding my voice to those of leaders across America in saying we wish this new president well and we look forward to working with his administration. But we all know President-elect Donald Trump ran a campaign that was often at odds with Audubon’s goals and its mission. Beyond that, his campaign challenged core values that Audubon holds dear. I want to address both of those points today.

Audubon has persevered and prospered through the tenure of presidents from across the political spectrum. Having seen administrations of all political flavors come and go, I want to assure you that we’re well positioned to continue to build on our 111-year legacy. It’s easy to talk about being a centrist network when political leadership has your back. But it’s even more valuable to be a centrist network when political leadership is in your face.

So, give yourselves the credit you’re due: We are a durable, respected, trusted, centrist conservation network with a deep and credible presence in communities all over the nation and the hemisphere. You work every day in communities to plant gardens, clean up trash, protect special places and vulnerable species, fledge new baby birds from nest boxes or beaches, engage people in the joy of birds and nature, prepare the next generation of conservation leaders, and stand up as advocates for birds and the environment we share. Those are our strengths, and all of those things are more important today than ever.

We will work with this new administration wherever we can. And, based on its campaign promises, it seems clear we’ll inevitably oppose it as well. And when we do that, we will do it in full throat and with all of the tools we know how to use, while not cheapening or personalizing the civil discourse that makes democracy special.

But this election wasn’t just about policy differences. For many, it was about core values of inclusiveness and multiculturalism, of equity and fairness. As Audubon’s CEO, here’s my topline message to each of you today as individuals and as leaders in the Audubon network: We value you, we respect you and we support you. We’ll have lots of conversations to come about how we will continue to make a difference for birds, our communities, and the environment in the days and months ahead. I welcome your questions and ideas.

I have zero doubt that birds are going to remain a powerful constant that can bring people together when we need it most. As Bruce Springsteen famously wrote, “Everybody’s got a hungry heart.” We will continue to help feed hearts across America as we’ve always done.



FEEDING HUMMINGBIRDS

The Anna’s Hummingbird is a year-round resident in California, so it will continue to be seen at feeders, even during winter months, though maybe not as frequently. So, please continue to provide hummingbird nectar during the winter. Below are “Tips for Feeding Hummingbirds” from the International Hummingbird Society.

Nectar Ingredients: One part sugar to 4 parts water or 1/4 cup sugar to 1 cup water

Dissolve the sugar in hot water. NO red food coloring! Unused mixture can be stored in refrigerator for up to a week.

- *cane sugar is suggested but beet sugar is okay - Do not use any other sugar and never use honey or artificial sweeteners*

Feeders: Type & Size & Location

- choose a feeder that you are able and willing to clean
- don’t fill the feeder all the way if it isn’t being used
- more feeders will support more hummers and help reduce territoriality
- put feeders at least four feet above the ground so they are beyond reach of cats and other predators
- if possible, the feeder should be in a shady spot

Maintenance

- feeders must be cleaned between refillings--don’t “top off” without cleaning
- use a mild detergent or vinegar and water; rinse thoroughly
- about once a month, soak the feeder in a solution of bleach and water (1Tbsp bleach per quart of water); rinse thoroughly

HOT SPRINGS VALLEY UPDATE & APPEAL

TO KAS MEMBERS: *The Hot Springs Valley addition to the Bob Powers Preserve will create an area to support many bird species, in particular, tri-colored blackbirds. In the past members from our Chapter have provided work hours helping to make this project a reality. This area is in 'our backyard', a birding paradise. Kern Audubon has also provided funds in the past. The acquisition is now so close. This is the last push. Please read about the project below. LAKE ISABELLA'S HOT SPRINGS VALLEY WETLANDS ACQUISITION UPDATE

Audubon has made a huge commitment of funds toward the acquisition of the 190 acre Hot Springs Valley Wetlands property at the edge of the community of Lake Isabella in the Kern River Valley: \$100,000 from Audubon's Wimberly Wildlife Fund for land Acquisition plus thousands of additional dollars donated by numerous Audubon Chapters.

The Hot Springs Valley is a satellite portion of the South Fork Kern River Valley Important Bird Area. It supports "Kern" Red-winged Blackbird and Tricolored Blackbird, both California Species of Special Concern. It supports the 2nd largest known population of the rare Alkali Mariposa Lily (with over 20,000 plants counted during the latest survey in May 2016).

GREAT NEWS! ALMOST THERE!!! Thanks to a match commitment made recently by a generous local donor to cover half of the final \$35,000 needed, \$17,500 in new donations will complete the fund raising for the \$825,000 acquisition of the 190 acre Hot Springs Valley Wetlands Project property in Lake Isabella. It would be highly unfortunate if after raising over \$790K plus the commitment of \$17.5K in matching funds, the acquisition fails due to the inability to raise the final \$17,500! If you are able, **PLEASE** help finish off this acquisition knowing your donation will be doubled by our generous local donor. Escrow is projected to close December 28 which means the \$825K must be in the escrow account before that date. BIRDS BENEFIT FROM DESERT RENEWABLE ENERGY CONSERVATION PLAN

The California desert landscape is teeming with unique species of flora and fauna. Interior Secretary Jewell's signing of the Desert Renewable Energy Conservation Plan (DRECP) was the culmination of years of hard work. Audubon's role was showing there doesn't have to be a choice between renewable energy and bird safety when the proper guidelines are put into place. This plan does just that, it stops state and federal fast-tracking of renewable energy projects without considering their ecological impacts. Why the focus on deserts? Deserts have become the most desired location for renewable energy development. Some of the birds of interest protected by this plan include Verdin, Cactus Wren, LeConte's Thrasher, Roadrunner, Bendire's Thrasher.

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNTS - KERN COUNTY

One of the traditions long-associated with Audubon is the annual Christmas Bird Count. Even older than Audubon itself, the CBC began in 1900 as an alternative to the traditional Christmas BIRD HUNT, in which teams shot as many birds as possible. The first count included 27 people in 25 locations, but they were armed with pencils and binoculars! The CBC is the oldest bird census in the world with over 50,000 volunteers in 2000 locations, providing one of the most important bodies of information on wildlife data in the world. The goal is to count all the birds in a 15 mile radius with teams being assigned to a section in that radius. Participants are typically assigned to teams based on their bird identification skill level and endurance. The count results are tabulated by National Audubon and Cornell Lab of Ornithology. Help is needed on many of these counts, so find one that interests you and contact the compiler for more information. (New birders are paired with veterans, so you don't have to be an expert.) Too cold to come out on a cold day? How about keeping a list of birds that you see in your yard on that day (be a "feeder watcher"), or you can join a team to cover a territory near

GIFT BOOK IDEA

Harry Love, Kern Audubon's Conservation Chair, offers this recommendation of a great book: *Jane Alexander, actress and member of the board of the national Audubon Society, has written a book, **Wild Things, Wild Places**, using her journeys over the years to highlight 23 endangered ecosystems. Each chapter revolves around the efforts of a different scientist that she was able to embed with and learn from in the field: Alan Rabinowitz, leader of Panthera and a loyal friend, whose life work is to protect jungle cats from the black market; Patricia Wright, whose expertise on lemurs and anthropology allows her to connect villagers in Madagascar to ranger-training programs; Tom Morgan, a master birder from the Putnam Highlands Audubon Society, who helped Alexander discover the migration phenomenon unfurling in her own backwoods.
