"THE OWENS LAKE STORY: Restoration & Migration"
Andrea Jones, Director of Conservation
Audubon California



Andrea Jones, Director of Bird Conservation for Audubon California, will kick-off Kern Audubon's program year with a presentation about Owens Lake and Audubon's role in creating a long-term conservation vision for this eastern Sierra lake. The lake has been returning to life since Los Angeles Department of Water and Power began rewatering the playa to control dust in 2004. Owens Lake is listed as a Globally Important Bird Area that attracts hundreds of thousands of migrating shorebirds, breeding shorebirds, waterfowl, and meadow birds. Audubon California, in partnership with Eastern Sierra Audubon, began a process in 2008 to ensure that the lake would remain a refuge for birds into the future. Andrea will describe the conservation process, it's successes and challenges, and describe the spectacle of bird migration that occurs at Owens Lake and along the eastern Sierra and its part in the Pacific Flyway.

HUMMINGBIRDS & FEEDERS

Hummers are migrating so you might see a Black-chinned or a Rufous at your feeder. Hummingbird solution should be changed every 2-3 days as it sours quickly in the heat. Refesh the solution and thoroughly clean feeders with a light mix of vinegar & water each time. Spoiled sugar water is bad for the birds!

Use a sugar solution of 4 parts hot water to one part sugar (e.g. 1 cup boiled water/1/4 cup white sugar). Red coloring is unnecessary. Extra solution can be stored in the refrigerator for up to 10 days.



NATIONAL RECOGNITION FOR HARRY LOVE

Our very own Kern Audubon president, HARRY LOVE, received national recognition by the Audubon Society when he was presented with the William Dutcher Award at the recent national convention in Virginia. Harry received the award, much to his surprise, during the Pacific Flyway meeting. The award was presented by Garry George, Chapter Network Director for Audubon California and was given in recognition of Harry's leadership of Kern Audubon in conservation, particularly on renewable energy and birds, tricolored blackbird restoration, climate presentations at County Board of Supervisor and City Council meetings, signing up to be a Climate Activist, and for his energy and enthusiasm – all in the Pacific Flyway. Audubon gives two Dutcher awards – named for William Dutcher the first President of Audubon – in each flyway. *Kern Audubon is proud of Harry and pleased about this recognition of his ongoing work and dedication to the mission of Audubon, especially in Kern County!*

EDUCATION TEAM SCORES BIG IN SHAFTER

The Shafter Youth Center invited Kern Audubon to tell the children in summer day camp about the wonderful world of birds. On Thursday, July 30, a team (pictured below right) made up of Kathy Love, Barbara Castle, Susan Castle, Barbara Reifel, Fran Hersh, Kevin Fahey, and Harry Love gave a one and a half our presentation about birds. Meeting the month before, the team decided the best way to handle 40 children was to divide them into 6 teams and to rotate around 6 stations. The location was a gym. The stations dealt with owls and raptors, binoculars and spotting scopes, drawing birds, food birds eat, a Jeopardy game about birds, and how birds are found in our daily lives. The children also received a folder with information about the Audubon Society, Tule elk, brochures on different birds, and a fun fact sheet about birds. One brochure was in Spanish. Susan started with the children doing a group Reader's Theater about why birds matter. It was followed by an hour of teams going from station to station. Yes, our volunteers were tired. But the smiles of children faces and proof that they remembered bird facts made all the work and effort worthwhile. Hopefully you can join the next education team....and join in the fun!
