Dr. John Karlik, Advisor Environmental Horticulture/Environmental Sciences Cooperative Extension Kern County



John Karlik is Extension Advisor for the University of California Extension program in Kern County, specializing in environmental horticulture and environmental science. His presentation will focus on practical suggestions for gardeners, especially related to creating a drought tolerant landscape. We will learn hands-on methods to conserve water, how to select decorative bird-friendly plants, and how to identify and eliminate water guzzling garden practices. Dr. Karlik is well-known in Kern County for teaching the popular Master Gardener certificate program through Kern County's UC Cooperative Extension program.

Sunday Feb. 28, 1:15pm - Kern & Pixley Nat'l Wildlife Refuges

Join us for an afternoon and early evening outing to nearby wildlife refuges. We will visit Kern NWR first to view late wintering ducks and shorebirds before traveling to Pixley NWR to watch the Sandhill Cranes as they fly onto the refuge at sunset. The cranes will head north in early March to their Canadian nesting grounds, so this is the last opportunity to see this beautiful spectacle of cranes and their haunting sound. PRESIDENT'S NEST

In September 2014, the National Audubon Society published its lengthy scientific report on Climate Change and Birds. The data indicated that 314 birds were 'on the brink' of being displaced and threatened by climate change. It indicated that people, businesses, and the government need to take immediate steps so these species can survive instead of going the way of the Passenger Pigeon. Since then, Audubon California has taken dramatic steps to make its members in California become aware of how climate change will affect the range and population of 140 California birds from the original 314 bird list. To 'get the message out', several workshops for chapter leaders have taken place throughout the state. Two of our leaders, Vice-president **KEVIN FAHEY** and Tehachapi outings/meetings leader **GREG HARGLEROAD**, attended a workshop in Ridgecrest. Members from Kerncrest Audubon, which covers eastern Kern County, also attended. Both Kevin and Greg received information about how to get this important message out to our members and the public. Please look forward to communications from them about how you can get involved. Remember, we are all in this together!



Migratory Bird Treaty Centennial 1916-2016: Celebrating 100 Years of Migratory Bird Conservation

The year 2016 marks the centennial of the Convention between the United States and Great Britain (for Canada) for the Protection of Migratory Birds (also called the Migratory Bird Treaty), signed on Aug. 16, 1916. The Migratory Bird Treaty, and three others that followed, form the cornerstones of our efforts to conserve birds that migrate across international borders. The Treaty connects the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service with our federal, state, private, non-governmental, tribal, and international partners, who share a long, successful history of conserving, protecting, and managing migratory bird populations and their habitats. Celebrating the centennial of the first Treaty allows us to bring together those who have contributed to its success, and to galvanize efforts to protect migratory birds for the generations to come.

Migratory birds:

- Connect people with nature and add beauty, sound and color to our world. They provide countless opportunities for enjoyment by birders, hunters, and outdoor enthusiasts and have cultural and spiritual importance.
- Contribute environmental benefits, including pollination, insect and rodent control, and seed dispersal. They are good indicators of environmental health because they are so visible and relatively easy to study. Studying birds can give us a picture of what is going on in the world.
- Play a key role in the U.S. economy, supporting recreational opportunities that create jobs and generate billions of dollars in revenue. Throughout this year and in 2016 the US Fish & WildlifeService will work with partners to create awareness, promote actions, increase support, and expand engagement in the conservation of migratory birds. A national strategy provides a framework for working together to achieve mutual goals and objectives. (Source: U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service)

HABITAT TO BE PURCHASED

Adjacent to the established 18 acre Bob Powers Gateway Preserve in the Kern River Valley is a 190 acre parcel of land in what is referred to as Hot Springs Valley. Both areas are prime bird habitat, especially for Red-wing and Tricolored Blackbirds. The Kern River Valley Heritage Foundation, a land trust, has the option to purchase this 190 acre parcel if it can raise \$900,000. When complete, the area will have birding trails and interpretive signage. *Many of our members have donated \$10 towards reaching this goal and the Kern Audubon Board has designated \$1,000 for this project.* Below are two "thank-you's" acknowledging Kern Audubon's donation toward this project.

GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT

IT'S AS EASY AS 1, 2, 3!

- 1. <u>Register for the count</u> or use your existing login name and password. If you have never participated in the Great Backyard Bird Count or any other Cornell Lab citizen-science project, you'll need to create a new account by going to www.birdcount.org
- 2. Count birds for at least 15 minutes on one or more days of the GBBC. You can count for longer than that if you wish! Count birds in as many places and on as many days as you like—one day, two days, or all four days. Submit a separate checklist for each new day, for each new location, or for the same location if you counted at a different time of day. Estimate the number of individuals of each species you saw during your count period.
- 3. Enter your results on the GBBC website by clicking "<u>Submit Observations</u>" on the home page. Or download the free <u>eBird Mobile app</u> to enter data on a mobile device. If you already participate in the eBird citizen-science project, please use eBird to submit your sightings during the GBBC. Your checklists will count toward the GBBC.

The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) is an annual four-day event that engages bird watchers of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of bird populations. Anyone can take part in the Great Backyard Bird Count, from beginning bird watchers to experts.

It's free, fun, and easy. Each checklist submitted during the GBBC helps researchers at the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the National Audubon Society learn more about how birds are doing, and how to protect them and the environment we share. Last year, more than 144,000 online checklists were turned in, creating the world's largest instantaneous snapshot of bird populations ever recorded.
