THE CARRIZO PLAINS NATIONAL MONUMENT Larry Saslaw, Biologist, Bureau of Land Management

The first meeting of 2007 will focus on the Carrizo Plains, located at the edge of western Kern County and eastern San Luis Obispo County. At 250,000 acres, it is the largest remaining remnant of original San Joaquin Valley habitat. Soda Lake is the centerpiece with its bed of white salt and a vast open grassland rimmed by steep mountains and traversed by the San Andreas Fault. It is made up of diverse communities of wildlife and plant species and is an area culturally important to Native Americans. The Carrizo Plain was designated a National Monument in 2001 and is managed jointly by the Bureau of Land Management, the Calif Dept. of Fish & Game and the Nature Conservancy.

Larry Saslaw, BLM biologist, will present a program on this fascinating natural area approximately 55 miles west of Bakersfield and will lead a field trip through the Plains on Saturday, January 20, 2007.

Come out for an interesting program, a fun evening and some raffle prizes!!

FIELD TRIP - CARRIZO PLAINS Sat. JANUARY 20, 2007 - 7:00am

Join us for a day's outing and birding at the Carrizo Plains National Monument, led by biologist Larry Saslaw and Dr. Ted Murphy, co-chair of Kern Audubon and retired biologist at CSUB. Birding should be rich with the most hoped for species being wintering Sandhill Cranes. Sometimes there are great numbers of Long-billed Curlews as well as Mountain and Western Bluebirds. Ferruginous and Rough-Legged Hawks may be seen as well as Golden Eagles, Mountain Plovers, Burrowing Owls, etc. Pronghorn are likely to be seen as well!

Meet at the Kern River Bike Path parking area across from CSUB at 7:00am. Bring snacks AND LUNCH, water, binoculars. Layered clothing is recommended as it is likely to be cold. There may be some hiking but not strenous. The drive to Carrizo is approximately an hour and a quarter, so plan on a day's outing, returning about 4:00pm. FOR THE BIRDS ...

Winter is a great time for backyard birding in the San Joaquin Valley. The day after Christmas the Goldfinches arrived at our thistle feeder and we have had a pair of Ruby-crowned Kinglets flittling through the rosebushes and underneath the grapefruit tree, close enough to observe the male's bright red crown. The number of House Finches seems to increase in winter as well as the migrants....White-crowned Sparrows and Audubon's Warblers. A Sharp-Shinned Hawk sent the birds scatterings a few days ago and landed in a neighbor's tree across the alley. And always there are the House Sparrows, Scrub Jays, Mockingbirds, the occasional Flicker, and Hummingbirds. Anna's Besides hummingbird feeder, we have three other feeders plus food for the scratchers, who are often joined by a pair of "feral" chickens who live in the neighborhood!

All of these provide some treasured moments when we take the time to sit at our breakfast nook and enjoy these wonderful creatures!

Ted Murphy (tmurphy@csub.edu) and I are grateful for the generous response of all who donated during the year-end appeal and at the December auction. With about \$3000 in the bank, we can prioritze program needs as we begin our first full year of chapter activity. The chapter was reactivated last March after a four year hiatus and we have just received word that we have been re-certified as a chapter of the National Audubon Society. During 2006-2007, the Membership Incentive Program will continue, which means that 100% of new members' payments will be returned to our chapter. BURROWING OWL SURVEY... The Institute for Bird Populations (IBP) is partnering with California Audubon chapters to perform surveys for Burrowing Owls throughout the entire breeding range during a two year period (2006-7). Volunteers are needed to conduct the surveys which help inform a perspective on the status and distribution of this sensitive species. Volunteering for the Breeding Burrowing Owl Survey is fun! Maps are provided of your survey area, instructions, data forms, and assistance if you have questions. Censusing a 5km x 5km survey block typically requires between 5 and 20 hours of work, depending on the location of the block. Survey work must be completed between May 15 and July 15 of 2007. If you did not participate in 2006 but are interested in participating in summer 2007, the second year of this 2-year project, please email us at owl@birdpop.org and provide contact information and county of residence. Your local volunteer coordinator will then contact you in early 2007 to see if you are still interested, and to provide the survey materials.

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
GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT - FEB. 16-19, 2007

What mid-winter activity is fun, easy, free, and helps bird conservation? What can parents and teachers do with children that connects them to a whole new world of natural wonders? This February, the tenth annual Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC), sponsored by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and National Audubon Society, will give everyone a chance to discover the birds in their neighborhood and "Count for the Record."

During February 16–19, 2007, people of all ages, from beginners to experts, are invited to join this event which spans all of the United States and Canada. Participants can take part wherever they are – at home, in schoolyards, at local parks or wildlife refuges. Observers simply count the highest number of each species they see during an outing or a sitting, and enter their tally on the Great Backyard Bird Count web site at www.birdsource.org/gbbc. This year marks the tenth anniversary of the GBBC, and by participating in greater numbers than ever before, with more checklists submitted, provides more information about bird population trends – and helps to better inform conservation efforts.

Last year, participants submitted more than 60,000 checklists – and reported 7.5 million birds overall and 623 different species. The count helped chronicle the early spring migratory routes of Sandhill Cranes, documented lingering migrants such as Orange-crowned Warblers and Tree Swallows, revealed the ongoing range expansion of introduced Eurasian Collared-Doves, and recorded declining numbers of American Crows.

Participants who want to hone their bird watching skills can learn more from the Great Backyard Bird Count web site, which offers identification tips and access to photos, sounds, maps, and natural history information on more than 500 bird species. People can also submit photos to an online gallery showcasing the dazzling array of winter birds found during the GBBC. Competitions add another element of fun, including a photo contest, rankings for most numerous birds, and the coveted "checklist champ" title for towns, states, and provinces with the highest participation.

A LIGHT BULB TO CHANGE THE

WORLD?! It costs less than \$3, but it has the power to change the world: the "compact flourescent lightbulb"...known in the energy business as CFL's or "energy savers." They have changed dramatically since first being introduced in 1985 and now all the orginal problems have been conquered: the bulbs come on quickly; their light is as bright & steady as a lightbulb; and the old U-shaped tubes have been replaced by the swirl or spiral and actually fit in the places we use bulbs!

What hasn't changed is the energy savings. CFL's emit the same light as incandescents, but use **75-80% less electricity!** What that means is that if 110 million American househods bought JUST ONE SWIRL CFL and screwed it in the place of an ordinary 60-watt bulb, the energy saved would be enough to POWER A CITY OF 1.5 MILLION PEOPLE...enough electricity to power all the homes in Delaware and Rhode Island. CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT UPDATE

The Bakersfield area CBC was led by John Wilson on Sunday Dec. 17th with a group of 13 birders, including Ted Murphy, Rick Hewitt, Gary File, Brenda & Ken Kyle, Mike McQuerry, Dennis & Kathy McDonnell, John Lindsay, Gordon Black, Bill Lydecker, and Kelli Levinson. A total of 131species was observed, a seven year low. John Wilson is also the Compiler for the Bakersfield CBC. John is also the Co-Editor of the California Christmas Bird Count.

The Buena Vista area CBC on December 20th was led by Alison Sheehy, and covered areas such as the Kern Water Bank, Tule Elk Reserve, Buena Vista Lake. Volunteers making up the two teams along with Alison were Barbara Reifel, Xiaohong Huang, Madi Elsea and Al diMartini. 111 species were observed. Alison Sheehy is also the Compiler for the Buena Vista CBC.

To support those who participated in the two counts, Kern Audubon paid the registration fee for each volunteer (\$5)...money well spent! We want to thank John Wilson & Alison Sheehy for their time and energy in organizing these counts as well as the compiling responsibilities!
