



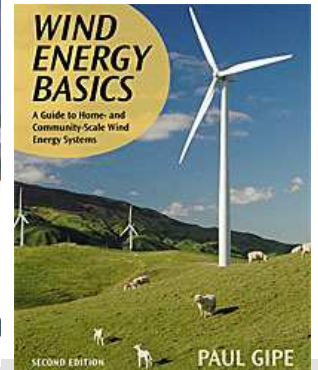
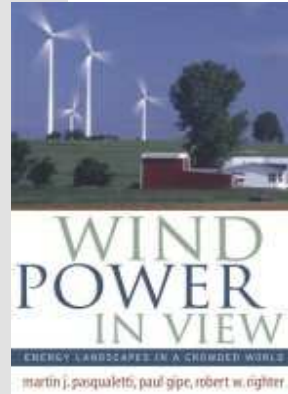

"Wind Works - Wind Energy: Environmental & Economic Sense"

Paul Gipe, Author & Renewable Energy Consultant

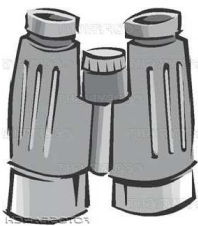


Paul Gipe is an award winning author, advocate, and renewable energy industry analyst who has worked with wind energy since 1976. After a trip to Denmark in 1981, Paul began emphasizing the theme that wind energy works and makes "economic and environmental sense." In 2004, Mr. Gipe launched a campaign to bring electricity "feed laws" back to North America. The campaign resulted in a continent-wide grassroots movement that has put renewable energy feed-in tariffs on the political agenda in the United States and Canada. His website, www.wind-works.org, is a wealth of information, and his most recent book, Wind Energy Basics: A Guide to Home- and Community Scale Wind Energy Systems, proves that wind energy can be done. Come to our March 1st Kern Audubon meeting to learn more and interact with Paul Gipe, a dynamic speaker and advocate for renewable energy, a hot topic nationwide and in Kern County!. Wind energy is also of concern because of its impact on birds and bats, so come and ask your questions!

MARCH FIELD TRIPS

MARCH 5-6 Carrizo Plain/Morro Bay

Join Kern Audubon for a weekend of birding in the Carrizo Plain and Morro Bay areas where we may see Golden eagles, owls, bluebirds, raptors, shorebirds and waterfowl. This will be a caravanning trip with Scott Frazer as leader. Meet Sat. March 5, 7:30am at the Loves gas station in Lost Hills, Hiway 46 and bird from there to Carrizo Plain. Bring water, snacks, lunch Late afternoon we will head for Morro Bay, meeting at a restaurant for dinner. Motel reservations need to be made by participants. Wed. March 16 , 7:30am - Poso Creek area

Come and explore this riparian area north of Bakersfield with Bill Cooper and State Park Ranger Bill Moffat. Meet at 7:30 am for breakfast at The Sugar Mill Restaurant, 2523 North Chester (& China Grade Loop) in Oildale or in the parking lot at 8:30; returning by 1:30. Bring water, binocs, sunscreen, snacks, good walking shoes, etc. Roger Coley, 832-1820, for info.

Sat. March 19, 7:30am - Tehachapi Area (Brite Lake, etc.)

Field trip leader is Richard Sparks, an extraordinarily experienced birder very familiar with the areas we will be visiting. Meet at the Chevron Station/Jack in the Box at the corner of Union Ave & Brundage (Union exit north off Hiway 58) for a 7:30 am departure, returning by 2pm. Bring water, binoculars, sunscreen, etc. Roger Coley 832-1820 for more information.

Sat. March 26, 2:30pm - Kern Foothills & Granite Station

We will be visiting the Granite Station home of Audubon members Lucy Clark & Clyde Golden. Meet at the Costco parking lot (Rosedale Highway) near the gas station for carpooling and departure at 2:30 PM. Directions will be provided at that time. There will be a good chance to view a variety of foothill birds, including a colony of tri-colored blackbirds, bluebirds, raptors, etc. Bring binoculars, sunscreen, water and definitely food, as we may enjoy the birds from the comfort of their deck while eating. Tricolored Blackbird Survey April 15-17, 2011

This April, as part of Audubon California's effort to help save one of California's most sensitive birds, volunteers will scour California for the rare Tricolored Blackbird. And your help is needed!

Audubon California and the Tricolored Blackbird Working Group are conducting the triennial statewide survey April 15-17 to estimate the current population of this imperiled species. Volunteers will survey known, historical colony sites as well as scout for new, unknown colony sites that have escaped detection. No prior experience is necessary and any help, big or small, is welcome.

To prepare for the survey, training sessions will be held for volunteers to learn the basics of surveying for North America's most colonial landbird. Wondering how to ID a Tricolored vs. a Red-winged Blackbird? Or how to accurately estimate the size of a 60,000 bird megacolony? These are the types of questions that will be answered at the training. For "veterans" of Tricolored Blackbird surveys past are encouraged to attend to get updated information on survey protocol, meet fellow volunteers, and help train the new recruits.

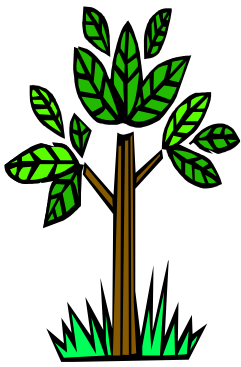

MARCH 5TH - PANORAMA VISTA PRESERVE

BIRDING ARIZONA WITH MICHAEL MCQUERRY

Southeast Arizona is legendary in US birding. The mountains of Mexico extend just into Arizona in the form of the "Sky Islands" of soaring mountains: Huachuca's, Chiricahua's, the Santa Rita's. The birds of Mexico and Central America follow these mountains into the US only in Arizona. There are nearly 100 species which occur nowhere else in the United States. Michael McQuerry, Kern Audubon member and frequent field trip leader, has birded southeastern Arizona summers for 30 years and has volunteered to lead a July birding trip for Kern Audubon. Below is a summary of what Michael is recommending for the trip, July 23-30. The cost is based on lodging (motels or camping) and food, to be arranged by each participant. Sat. July 23 - Arrival, set up camp and hotels in Sierra Vista

July 24-25: Hummingbirds at Ramsey, Miller, and Ash Canyons (13 species of hummingbird)

July 26: Patagonia loop: *Thick-billed Kingbird, Varied Bunting, Gray Hawk, Violet-crowned Hummingbird*

July 27: San Pedro River: *Tropical Kingbird and sparrows, Gilded Flicker*

Evening, owling: *Elf, Whiskered Screech, Whip-poor-will, Common Poorwill*

July 28: Ft. Huachuca: *Sparrows (Botteri's, Cassin's, Rufous-winged), canyon birds, Sulphur-bellied Flycatcher, Buff-breasted Flycatcher, and all the myiarchus flycatchers.*

July 30: Departure. Those who wish to continue, we'll head to the Chiricahua Mountains. If we haven't found it already, the *Elegant Trogon* is common, here. One of our days here, we will head to the high country to get *Mexican Chickadee* and the highland warblers: *Olive Warbler, Red-faced Warbler, and Grace's Warbler*. They aren't common, but always there somewhere.

Those new to this area should have at least 35 lifers and maybe as many as 45. It's stunning birding. I love southeast Arizona. Two of my top five birding memories are there. This will be another memorable trip and I hope you can join us.

AUDUBON CHAPTERS - ACTING LOCALLY

I am constantly amazed and impressed by the work that I see Audubon chapters carrying out in their local communities. I spend most of my weekdays throughout the Central Valley and Sierra Nevada, and the Audubon chapters I visit are working on an incredible range of issues and projects. From outdoor education programs that connect children with nature, to riparian restoration projects, to native plant gardens, to people conducting citizen science surveys...and all this done entirely by volunteers. There seems to be no end to the energy and resources being put into improving circumstances for birds.

And it's a good thing - because without these efforts, our birds would undoubtedly be suffering.

The ongoing and uphill nature of working to protect wildlife and natural resources can sometimes be overwhelming. Between increasingly gloomy climate change scenarios, the constant threat of drought, and our disappearing natural landscapes, it's easy to get discouraged. Political leaders often appear disconnected from what's really happening in local communities, and even those with the very best intentions often struggle to realize their conservation promises.

The importance of local involvement in the conservation movement really cannot be overstated. It just makes sense. Nobody understands the beauty, history, and significance of your landscape better than you. And no one will work harder to protect it. Conservation groups that have lasting impact realize that even projects and issues that appear small may have significant impact over time, and that every step we take today brings us closer to a brighter conservation future.
