### KERN AUDUBON PROGRAM Tues, May 7th at 7pm

The Return of California Condors to Kern County and beyond Joseph Brandt Supervisory Wildlife Biologist USFWS California Condor Recovery Program

Join us for a talk on the challenges the California condor reintroduction effort has faced in bringing this magnificent bird back from the brink of extinction, including efforts here in Kern County. We will hear about the changes in recovery strategies for the future as the wild population of condors grows and occupies more and more of its former range.

Joseph Brandt has been a part of the condor program since 2005 when he started as a volunteer intern at the Hopper Mountain National Wildlife Refuge Complex. He has also worked along the Big Sur coast tracking condors for the Ventana Wildlife Society and was the first to locate a condor nest in Monterey County in over 100 years. Before working with condors, Joseph worked with grizzly bears in Montana, sea birds along the Oregon Coast and with penguins in Southern Chile.

### **May Field Trips**

Sat-Sun, May 4-5, Overnight Desert Oasis Birding with Ali Sheehey This is a full weekend of migrant trap birding and nature watching in the Kern County desert and southern Sierra Nevada with Ali Sheehey (<a href="www.natureali.org">www.natureali.org</a> ph. 760-417-0268). All parts of the weekend are optional. Later in the day arrivals should call or text Ali to find the group. No cell phone coverage available Sunday in the mountains and Butterbredt area. Saturday and Sunday will be all-day outings so bring drinks, food, and snacks for breakfasts and lunches and lots of water. The Best Western in California City is a great option for those wanting a good Friday night's sleep before Saturday's 5:45 a.m. start time.

**Saturday, May 4.** Due to the annual off-road race in Jawbone Canyon, our adventure will begin in California City, stopping at scouted hotspots and, depending on the number of participants, some areas may or may not be covered. Saturday morning will be extensive birding at California City's Central Park beginning at dawn. **Meet at 5:45 a.m.** at the Best Western Motel at 10386 California City Blvd, across from Central Park. (Late arrivals can meet the group at the main Central Park parking lot **about 7 a.m.**) Later participants can text Ali (760-417-0268) to find out where the group is the moment you arrive in California City. Depending on birdyness we may move fast or slow.

**Saturday evening**: We will regroup in California City to pick up cars left for the day at the Best Western. Dinner will be in Cal City restaurants; look for our group at Gloria's Mexican Restaurant, 7027 California City Blvd. Saturday night we will get a late start up to Butterbredt Spring and camp in the Butterbredt camping area that the Friends of Jawbone and BLM have set-up. There are no toilet facilities or water at the site.

**Sunday, May 5.** We will be up pre-dawn to catch the migration. The windier the night, the better the morning migration. (Lousy weather = great birding). We will bird the springs walking down as far as we can as a group, those who feel less ambitious can stay at the cottonwood forest and help the group find birds that might have been missed on the walk down the canyon. After Butterbredt, we will wind our way up Kelso Valley and into the Piute Mountains for mountain birds and then head back down into the Kern River Valley to stop at the Kern River Preserve and Isabella Reservoir. ### **May Field Trips Cont.**

Sat, May 11, 8:00-9:30 am – Panorama Vista Preserve in Bakersfield Our usual second Saturday bird walk at a local birding jewel. 900 acres on the Kern River below the Panorama Bluffs in northeast Bakersfield. Afterwards keep birding or join any PVP volunteers at work. Bring water and binoculars (loaners available). Directions: Take Union Ave north, veering left onto Manor St when Union Ave ends. After crossing the Kern River, take the Roberts Lane onramp. At the top of the ramp, turn left (east) onto Roberts Ln. Proceed ½ mile, past horse stables on the right, and meet at the gate across the end of Roberts Ln. For info: call Mac at (661) 589-7768.

Tues. May 14, 8:30 am – Fort Tejon and Quail Lake Margaret Dolan and Linda McMillian will lead this field trip to Fort Tejon and then to the Quail Lake area off Hwy 138. We will do short walks at each location, looking for migrants and mountain species. Bring snacks, water, binoculars (loaners available) and layered clothing. Before returning home, join the group for lunch in Gorman. Directions to Fort Tejon: Take I-5 south toward Lebec and Frazier Park. At exit 210, take ramp right and follow signs for Fort Tejon. Carpoolers from Bakersfield meet at 7:30 am at Stockdale Hwy/Hwy 99 park n ride between Real Rd and Hwy 99. \$10 gas donation suggested for drivers. For info: call Mac McCarthy at 589-7768.

Tues. May 21, 8:30-11:30 am - Canebrake Ecological Reserve on the South Fork of the Kern River off Hwy 178: Mickey Dyke will lead a morning bird walk. Level, well-maintained trails wind through two thousand acres of riparian and woodland habitat Afterwards, stop for lunch at the historic and charming Onyx Store on Hwy 178 for a made to order sandwich from its well-regarded deli. There are lots of old-time teas, sodas, and candies. Directions: Canebrake Reserve is on Hwy 178 about 15 miles east of the Isabella Reservoir and past Weldon and Onyx. Reserve's sign and parking lot will be on the left about 5 miles east of Onyx. Carpoolers from Bakersfield meet at 7:00 am at Albertson's parking lot on the north side of the junction of Hwy 178 and Mt Vernon. For info: call Mac McCarthy at (661)589-7768.

Please note that these are guidelines and resources to help find the trained, permitted individuals or organizations to help wildlife in need. Do not put your safety at risk or the animal's safety at risk without notifying the proper agencies and/or facilities. In California possessing wildlife is illegal without the proper permits. However, California Department of Fish and Wildlife (Department or CDFW) allows for temporary confinement of the animal, small terrestrial animals, as long as the nearest regional office has been notified (see **regional office contacts**). Note large carnivores, such as bear and mountain lion, shall be handled by the Department or other government agency in the jurisdiction they fall under. The Department requires information about the finder and location where the animal was found (name and address; the species of wildlife and a description of its injury, disease or condition; the date and location the wildlife was found; and the location where the wildlife is confined). If you are anywhere in California and find an injured or orphaned wild terrestrial animal, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife has a list of permitted wildlife centers at

If a marine mammal has been found. The animal cannot be confined or rescued by any finder. Only trained, permitted facilities are legally allowed to rescue.

Please call a Marine Mammal Center for trained professionals to help.

If you have a smart phone, two mobile apps were developed to find help for a wild animal. The app will help you find the nearest wildlife facility that specializes in the animal you have found. WildHelp and Animal Help Now will help find a wildlife professional nearest you.

#### SAVING VALUABLE LAND FOR BIRDS!

The California Wildlife Conservation Board voted unanimously to approve \$1,385,000 toward the acquisition of eight properties: Bird Spring, Brown Flat, Dove Spring, Freeman Junction, Frog Spring, Mustang Spring, Shoemaker Spring, and Tunnel Spring. In addition, Audubon California contributed \$100,000 towards the purchase. The properties will be managed by several land trusts. The Kern Audubon Society, along with other groups, provided a letter of support. These properties, by the fact that they are springs, provide a resting and feeding location for migrate birds passing through the region between the San Joaquin Valley and the Mojave Desert. The land is currently in private hands and the expected close of escrow in June will finalize the sale. Much thanks goes out to **Bob Barnes, Reed Tollefson**, and others in making this very important preservation of key birding properties possible.

**UPDATE ON RAPTORS** 

There are over 40,000 nesting red-tailed, cooper, and sharp shin hawks in California and about 4,000 productive pairs of falcons, both peregrine and prairie. However, the primitive nesting areas for the prairie falcon are also found within Off-Highway Vehicle lands. It is important that a cooperative plan needs to be developed so that these two 'species' can co-exist. ### **CLIMATE CHANGE CORNER**

Energy storage keeps improving: How we create energy with renewables is important. How we store this energy – so we can use it when needed – is just as critical. That's because the sun doesn't shine 24 hours a day every day, nor is it always windy. The good news is this: we're seeing incredible progress in energy storage as batteries get better and demand keeps growing. The numbers here are headed in the right direction. "Roughly 790 megawatts of [renewable] energy were stored last year and overall capacity is expected to hit 45 gigawatts in seven years". (And in case you're not an engineer, that's a whole lot of energy.)
