KERN AUDUBON SOCIETY MEETING/PROGRAM TUES. OCTOBER 6, 2009 - 7:00PM Kern Supt of Schools, 17th & L Sts. "Between Science and Magic...The Continuing Search for the Ivory-billed Woodpecker" Presented by David Pereksta, USFWS



The lvory-billed Woodpecker has been shrouded in mystery and disbelief for over a century. Called the "Grail Bird" and the "Lord God Bird", it is one of the most prized birds sought by birdwatchers. David Pereksta will take us on a journey through the tragic and misunderstood history of this magnificent bird. He will chronicle its decline through the 1800s, the rediscoveries and apparent extinction in the first half of the 1900's, the litany of unconfirmed sightings and evidence through the latter half of the 20th century, the most recent rediscovery in 2004, and his own participation in searches for the IBWO from 2006 through 2009. If you do not believe the lvory-billed Woodpecker still exists, you may need to reevaluate!



Dave is an Assistant Field Supervisor for the US Fish & Wildlife Service, where he works to conserve habitat for threatened and endangered species and migratory birds. Throughout his career , he has studied several imperiled bird species including snowy plovers, least terns, ospreys northern goshawks, brown pelicans, and spotted owls. An avid birder and nature photographer for over 30 years, he is an active member of Ventura Audubon. He has seen over 1,500 species in travels in the Americas; photographing nearly 900 species along the way.

Remember to keep hummingbird feeders clean using a solution of one part white vinegar to four parts water. Use a bottle brush to clean the inside and rinse well. Fill feeders with sugar water (four parts HOT water to one part white sugar). Never use honey and avoid red food coloring. *Change solution twice a week during the hot weather!!*

REVISED BIRDER ACCESS POLICY FOR SILVER SADDLE RESORT/GALILEO HILL

As of Sept. 1, 2009 and until further notice, Silver Saddle/Galileo Hill is closed to the public (non-members), including birders** on <u>weekends</u> (Fridays at noon, Saturdays, Sundays, and long holiday weekends). Birders may continue to access the grounds on <u>weekdays</u>: Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and before noon on Fridays. ALL facilities except the campground** are off limits every day of the week. The bungalows, hotel, restaurant, and RV park are no longer accessible to birders or any other non-member at any time. Birders can use the grounds, the outside restrooms and picnic areas, but are restricted from using any of the buildings.

**The campground is open all week for anyone, including non-member birders, who care to rent a space (\$100/day on weekends, \$45/day on weekdays). Weekend camping can be shared by up to 7 people, 2 cars, 2 large tents (or 4 small tents). *This means that those who wish to bird at Silver Saddle on the weekend can only do so if you have registered and paid for a campsite at the campground*! Birders who are registered campers can eat in the restaurant when open on weekends.

The staff at Silver Saddle continues to welcome birders within the guidelines of this new corporate directive.

Further note from Bob Barnes: to separate birders (who are welcome) from non-birder nonmembers (who will be asked to leave by Silver Saddle security any time found on site), please check in at the <u>hotel office as close to 8:30am</u> opening hours as possible to tell Silver Saddle staff you are a birder so they can tell security. If you start birding at dawn, please work your way over to the hotel office by 8:30am to check in. If you are approached by security before 8:30am, tell them you are a birder and that you have been asked to check in at the hotel office c. 8:30am and that you will do so.

Our thanks to Bob Barnes (Ridgecrest Audubon) and Kelli Levinson (Kern Audubon) for working with the staff of Silver Saddle on clarification of these new access rules. If you are planning to bird at Silver Saddle, you are asked to cooperate with the changes so that we might continue to have access to this very important bird area and birding spot in the Mojave Desert. LONG-BILLED CURLEW SURVEY UPDATE

Gary Langham, Audubon California's Director of Bird Conservation, reports that the recent Longbilled Curlew survey was a success. Gary says: "We've already surpassed our previous curlew counts with 20,303 so far." More survey results are still to be returned, so the total may go higher. Enjoy Fall at our National Wildlife Refuges

Flooding of the refuge has begun and the ducks are starting to return to the **Kern National Wildlife Refuge**, 20 miles east of Delano, and fall is a great time to visit. Two new observation platforms have been built and there is a new auto tour route which will be open all year, even during hunting season. At the **Pixley Nat'l Wildlife Refuge** 20 miles west of Earlimart, the Sandhill Cranes will be flying in starting in September and stay for the winter, providing a great opportunity to view these primordial birds, which are best seen at sunset as they fly back to the refuge to spend the night in safety. Here's the first review from Trude:

I want to highlight a wildlife masterpiece by one of the great American waterfowl biologists, Paul A. Johnsgard's, SONG OF THE NORTH WIND A Story of the Snow Goose, published in 1974. This small book of only 106 pages tells the story of the annual life cycle of snow geese in the Nebraska-Louisiana flyway. The story follows the geese from arrival on their breeding grounds through nest building, gosling education, staging, migration, waterfowl hunting seasons, and wintering along the Gulf of Mexico. Included are beautiful creation stories and myths from Native American culture and lovely original drawings by Paul Geraghty. This book will be enjoyed by all who admire birds, and especially waterfowl.
