"The Tejon Ranch Conservation Agreement"

Guest speaker: GRAHAM CHISHOLM Director of Conservation, Audubon California



The Tejon Ranch Conservation Agreement announced in May 2008 secures 375 square miles of California's largest contiguous land holding. The ranch is at the crossroads of four distinct ecological regions, and home to innumerable rare species including California Condor, San Joaquin Kit Fox, Spotted Owl, and many more. Audubon California's Graham Chisholm will discuss the details of the agreement, as well as the many issues at play during negotiations with the Tejon Ranch Company. This promises to be an exciting and informative program about the historic agreement reached between Tejon Ranch and several environmental organizations, including Audubon CA, to preserve 90% of Tejon Ranch's rich habitat from development. Graham Chisholm was one of the principal negotiators and has also been selected to chair the Tejon Ranch Conservancy, which will oversee the care and use of the newly protected wildlands.

TURKEY VULTURE FESTIVAL Sept. 27-28, 9am - 4pm

The Kern River Valley Turkey Vulture Festival celebrates the height of fall Turkey Vulture migration through California's "Valley Wild", the Kern River Valley. One of the two largest known migration sites in North America (north of Mexico) - 7,664 Turkey Vultures were counted during the 2004 festival with 24,000 counted from September 14th - October 14th. The magnitude of the migration over this southern Sierra Nevada count site is awe inspiring. This is also the fall migration period for land birds, including eastern rarities. The preserve is located near Weldon on Hiway 178, one hour east of Bakersfield.

Kern Audubon is offering a <u>field trip</u> to the festival on Sat. Sept. 27th, meeting at <u>6:45am at the Shell Station at corner of Brundage & Union.</u> After the TV "lift-off" we will stop for brunch at the Sierra Cafe near the refuge and return around noon. EXPLORE OUTDOOR FIELD DAY - SEPT. 27TH - KERN NAT'L WILDLIFE REFUGE

In celebration of Public Lands Day, the Kern Nat'l Wildlife Refuge will hold an "Explore Outdoor" Field Day on Sat. Sept 27th, beginning with a guided bird tour at 7:30AM. Activities will be held during the morning hours, including a Retriever demonstration, childrens' activities and an "Around the Pond" walk. Booths and displays will be hosted by friends and organizations of KNWR, such as Kern Audubon, Dept of Fish & Game, Tulare Basin Wetlands Association, Calif State Parks, and others. A FREE lunch will be provided with activities concluding after lunch.

KNWR is located approximately 45 minutes north of Bakersfield. Take Hiway 99 north to Hiway 46. Go west on Hiway 46 thru Wasco to Corcoran Road. Go north on Corcoran Rd. approximately 10 miles to the refuge, which is at the corner of Corcoran & Garces Hiway.

Public Comment on

Bitter Creek National Wildlife Refuge

The Bitter Creek Refuge was established in 1985 to provide safe roosting and foraging habitat for California Condors. Condors are now flying back and forth between Ventura County and Bitter Creek NWR. A large flight pen is housed at the refuge and is used to hold condors that are injured or getting ready to be released into the wild. You can view the refuge along HWY. 166 and Cerro Noroeste Rd, with the possibility of seeing a condors.

The primary habitat of the refuge is open grassland providing valuable foraging habitat, which has been historically by the wild condor population. Several springs are found within its boundaries and creeks flow intermittently, depending upon rainfall. The refuge protects the habitat of a variety of plants and animals, including the golden eagle, prairie falcon and the endangered San Joaquin kit fox and blunt-nosed leopard lizard and Bitter Creek Canyon provides a riparian corridor. Birders have the opportunity to spot golden eagles, prairie falcons, rough-legged hawks, Swainson's hawks (winter), tri-colored blackbirds, loggerhead shrikes and many other species.

Currently the US Fish and Wildlife Service, the management agency of the refuge, is in the process of accepting public comment on a proposed management plan. A recent article in the *Bakersfield Californian* by Lois Henry caused Fish & Wildlife to extend the comment period from July 31 to September 30, 2008. Of the four alternative action plans, Audubon CA supports Alternative D, a combination of four grass management tools: grazing, prescribed burning, mowing, and herbicide in order to improve native grasses, thus improving on the biodiversity. This alternative offers the best opportunity to return the area to its natural state and to provide the best foraging opportunities for the condors.
