"SALTON SEA: A Looming Crisis for Birds, the Environment and People" Michael Lynes, Director of Public Policy Audubon California



The Salton Sea has been shrinking rapidly since 2003, when a water transfer agreement began to send portions of Imperial Valley's water to urban areas. As the sea continues to shrink, it will expose up to 100 square miles of lakebed, resulting in massive air pollution in a region that already has some of the worst air pollution and public health rates in the state. Moreover, birds will lose tens of thousands of acres of shoreline and deep water habitat. If a long-range management plan for a smaller, sustainable sea is not created and funded by the State of California, the sea will become so salty and polluted that it will be inhospitable to fish, invertebrates, and birds. Our speaker will update us on this critical situation and Audubon California's efforts to find solutions.

Michael Lynes is the Director of Public Policy for Audubon California and one of the leads for Audubon's work at the Salton Sea. Prior to joining Audubon California in 2014, Mike was the Conservation Director and Executive Director of the Golden Gate Audubon Society in the San Francisco Bay Area, where he focused on regional planning and improving conditions for Bay Area birds. Before then, Mike worked as an attorney representing nonprofit groups in environmental protection lawsuits. Mike started his career as a biologist with the Point Reyes Bird Observatory (now Point Blue Conservation Science), where he focused on birds in riparian, wetland, and oak woodland habitats. Mike lives in Davis, California with his wife and two sons, who are currently more interested in catching Pokemon than watching birds!

SEPTMEMBER FIELD TRIPS

Tuesday, Sept. 13 - 8:00-10:30 AM - Uplands Kern River Walk

Join Kern Audubon on the Kern River for the first walk of the fall season. 

AUDUBON CALIFORNIA KERN RIVER PRESERVE

Fall is here and the birds are moving from their summer breeding grounds in North America to the wintering grounds in Central and South America. As birds fly south they need places like the Kern River Preserve to rest and replenish on their way. One of the largest concentrations of migrating Turkey Vultures in North America comes down the Sierra Nevada and through the Kern Valley. If we are lucky we may see "kettles" of vultures swirling up into the morning sky around 8:30 am. This is a great time of year to get out and enjoy the Kern River Preserve.

<u>:00 am</u> – Early Bird Walk -The nature trails at the Kern River Preserve are beautiful in the fall. Take this walk with local guide to see birds and wildlife.

<u>8:15am-10am</u> – **Bird Walk** (beginner to expert). Easy walking on flat preserve road & trail <u>westward</u> from Kern River Preserve Headquarters.

<u>9 AM to 2</u> PM-Information Booth-Staff and volunteers will keep you informed about this event and the Kern River Preserve. Stop in and buy a t-shirt or learn how to become a supporter of the Kern River Preserve. We have T-shirts with beautiful bird art work by John Schmitt and other artist in many sizes.

<u>10:00</u>AM – Natural History Walk – Learn about the plants animals and ecology of the Kern River Preserve on this walk with a local conservation biologist.

<u>10 AM</u> to Noon-Children's Activities - a great way to learn about birds and wildlife. Kids can do nature art, dissect owl pellets (yuck), learn bird identification and make bagel bird feeders.

<u>Noon to 1:00pm</u> - Live Music - Local bands provides lovely acoustic music for the enjoyment of our guests. Sit in the shade and enjoy the Preserve and music while having a leisurely lunch. **BYO lunch and a cool drink.**

PUT YOUR STAMP ON CONSERVATION

Originally known as the Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp, the Duck Stamp was conceived in 1934 when Congress passed and President Franklin D., Roosevelt signed the Migratory Bird Hunting Stamp Act. The first Duck Stamp was designed by JN "Ding" Darling, then director of the Bureau of Biological Survey, forerunner to today's US Fish & Wildlife Service.

The Federal Duck Stamps are conservation revenue stamps--98% of the purchase price goes directly to help acquire and protect wetland habitat and purchase conservation easements for the National Wildlife Refuge System. Buying Duck Stamps is among the simplest ways that anyone (hunters & birders) can participate in wildlife and habitat conservation. Duck stamps are a required annual purchase for waterfowl hunters 16 and older and a current duck stamp grants the bearer free entrance to any national wildlife refuge. But whether a hunter, birder or other outdoor enthusiast or you simply want to help preserve our natural resources for future generations to enjoy, you can contribute to conservation by buying Duck Stamps.

Duck Stamps can be purchased at many major sporting goods stores, local post offices (call ahead to make sure they have them), American Birding Association (aba.org/abasales/), Kern National Wildlife Refuge. Your \$25 Duck Stamp purchase supports bird conservation!

Protect California's Plastic Bag Ban

This year, California became the first state in the nation to ban single-use plastic carry out grocery bags. Gov. Jerry Brown signed the groundbreaking law that had support from a vast coalition of supporters including local governments, business groups, workers unions, retailers, environmental organizations and more. More than one-third of Californians now live in a community with no single-use plastic grocery bags. In California, 147 cities and counties have joined those across the world banning plastic shopping bags, reducing litter and ushering in a new culture of reusable carryout bags. Non-biodegradable, plastic bags persist in the environment for decades, while their useful life is typically measured in minutes. Plastic bags pollute our waterways and beaches, litter our neighborhoods and parks, and gravely threaten wildlife, especially birds and marine life. California cities and counties spend an estimated \$428 million annually to clean up litter and prevent marine pollution. Plastics bags contribute \$34 million to \$107 million to these costs.

Unfortunately, on the November 8 ballot is a proposition intended to undo this law...supported by the plastic bag industry! If you wish to know more about this threat to the law, visit https://protectplasticbagban.org. Your financial contribution and support will be greatly appreciated.

Today's Google doodle honors the renown birder Phoebe Snetsinger. The colorful, animated image includes Snetsigner with her binoculars, and five of her most notable finds: the blackburnian warbler, red-shouldered vanga, village weaverbird, eastern bluebird, and red-capped manakin.

According to the Google Doodle Blog, Snetsinger traveled around the world to witness a number of obscure birds. She saw a total of 8,393 bird species – the highest count of any other birder in the world at that time.
